2023 was a time of committed service for many in volunteer leadership roles with Chesapeake Housing Mission. Several members of the Board of Directors devoted extended time and resources in the absence of an Executive Director. Making the most of the adjustment, they were still able to serve significant numbers of those in need in the community. Recognizing that this often took sacrifice in their personal and professional lives, these steadfast leaders remained determined to see Chesapeake Housing Mission thrive.

In the fall of 2023, Lachelle Scarlato was hired as the Executive Director for Chesapeake Housing Mission. Those same committed volunteers and part time staff then embarked on training Lachelle collectively on all that is essential for the daily operations and oversight of the organization. In the field with clients and in the office with administrative duties, the process began of a comprehensive onboard all while in a busy fall building season, with a full schedule.

The annual report details the statistics of individuals assisted in 2023, underscoring the indispensable role of donors to Chesapeake Housing Mission. Each donation, no matter the size, significantly impacts the scope of our assistance across the four Lower Shore counties. Without the resources to plan, procure, and execute our initiatives, our ability to serve is compromised. However, the demand for our services only continues to rise.

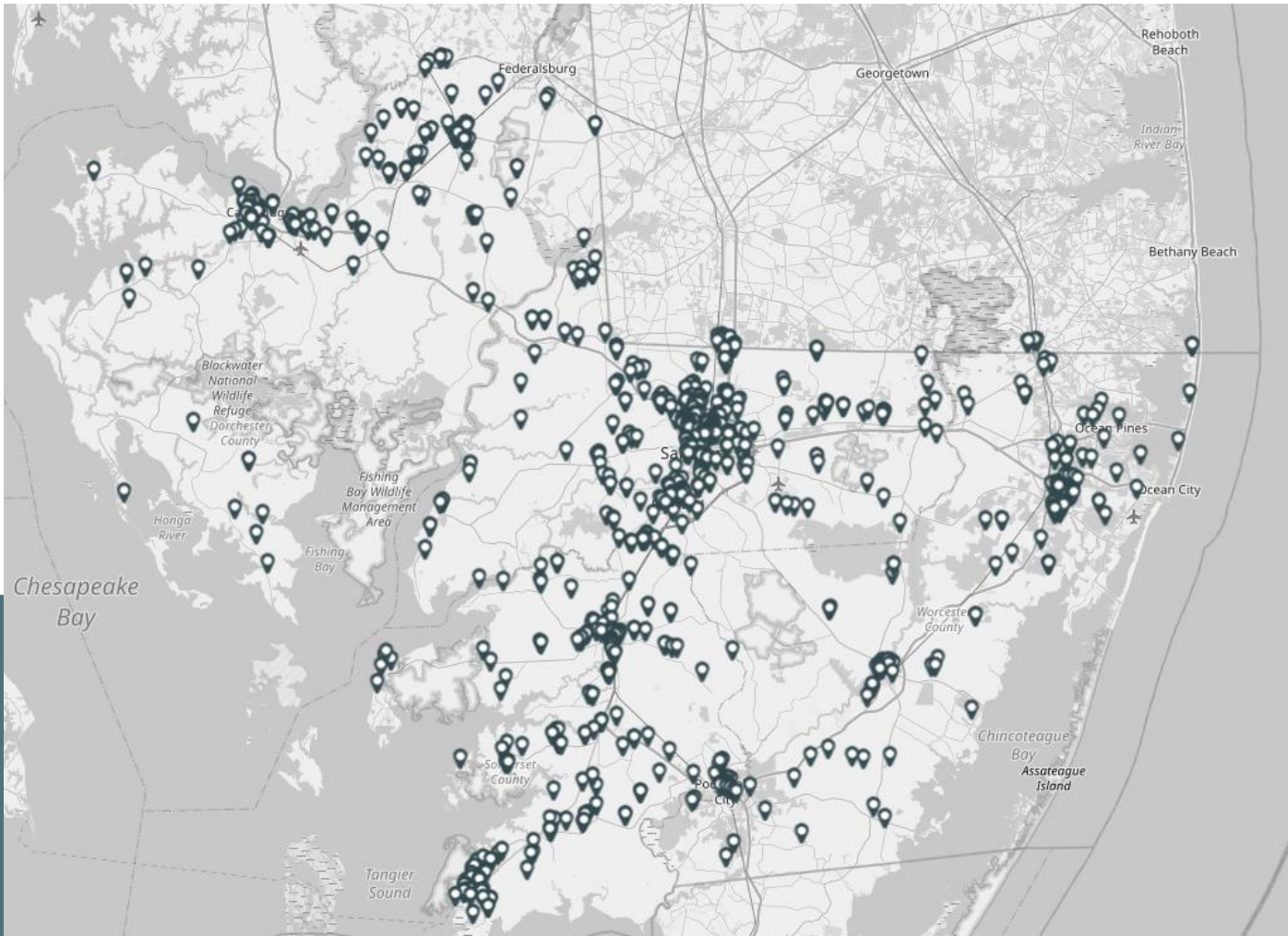

OUR PERFORMANCE

Throughout 2023, CHM underwent a period of significant transition with the handover of the Executive Director role in the fall. Despite these changes, the organization achieved a milestone with a record number of project completions by year-end. In 2022, CHM had already set a high bar by completing 111 projects, but in 2023, this number surged to 141, representing a remarkable 27% increase over the previous year. Such an accomplishment is particularly noteworthy for a nonprofit of CHM's size and scope, and it stands as a testament to the dedication and effort of both volunteers and staff.

Since its inception in 2009, CHM has completed a total of 928 projects, evidence to its ongoing commitment to improving the communities it serves. These numbers serve as a powerful reminder of the tangible difference CHM is making in the lives of its friends and neighbors, reinforcing the organization's mission and inspiring continued dedication to its cause.

THE GIFT OF ACCESSIBILITY

Bernetta L. and her husband, David, of 56 years, both contend with mobility issues, making it progressively harder for them to navigate the steps leading to their home. On a beautifully sunny day last October, a ray of hope emerged when the TidalHealth IT department organized a volunteer team, led by Jenny Harsin and Carol Morgan.

With sleeves rolled up and hearts open, they built a wheelchair ramp for the couple, ensuring easier access to their home. But their kindness didn't stop there; they also surprised Bernetta and David with new patio furniture and gift cards.

"Working in healthcare, even if behind the scenes in IT, we know there are people who need assistance," said Jenny. "To be able to come together and help build a ramp, that will allow for easy access in and out of a house, may seem small, but it's a reminder that what seems small to us is huge to those in need."

At 80 years old and still working part-time, Millie dedicates her time to transporting disadvantaged children for the Board of Education. Unable to afford the needed repairs, Millie turned to CHM for assistance.

Volunteers from Nelsons Memorial Church in Hebron came together in May to construct a new deck and stairs, providing Millie with peace of mind as she enters and exits her home. “The tears I cried were tears of happiness,” said Millie. “I want to thank Chesapeake Housing Mission for the great work they did on my home. Edward S., aged 77, a father of three and retired commercial painter, was once recruited as a young man to play for a major league baseball team in Houston, Texas. Besides his love for baseball, Edward was also passionate about fishing, often taking his sons on fishing trips whenever possible.

Now, facing health challenges, Edward S. grapples with daily mobility issues and struggles to leave the house for medical appointments. Donna, his wife, expressed gratitude after the Avery Hall Benefit Solutions volunteer team constructed a ramp on a rainy day in May. “We can’t thank you enough for your generosity – the materials and of course the volunteers. Founded in 2013 by Navy Veteran Chris Eccleston, this unique commercial construction firm not only builds structures but also builds futures for U.S. Armed Forces Veterans. Their mission is clear: to provide employment opportunities and support for those who have served their country.

Under the leadership of Kathryn Ellis, Vice President, the team at Delmarva Veteran Builders goes above and beyond to make a difference in their community. With a workforce comprised of 35% veterans and reservists, they embody the spirit of service and dedication.

In June, the team embarked on a mission to change lives by constructing a wheelchair ramp for 77-year-old Dorothy G. Dorothy, reliant on a walker, found herself struggling to navigate her own home safely. With grace and compassion, the team swiftly built a ramp, granting Dorothy newfound freedom and independence. Her gratitude overflowed as she expressed her thanks, reflecting on the professionalism and kindness of the team.

In November, the spirit of giving continued to flourish at

Delmarva Veteran Builders. In honor of Veteran's Day, they embarked on their next project, this time for Leo M., a 77-year-old Army veteran who served in the Vietnam War. Alongside his devoted wife, Ruth, Leo faces daily challenges exacerbated by his disability.

With steadfast commitment, the team constructed a second wheelchair ramp, providing Leo with the gift of mobility and freedom. Moved by their generosity, Ruth described the team as "sweet, loving, and respectful," their actions speaking volumes of their commitment to service. But their kindness didn't end there. In a heartwarming gesture, the team extended their support beyond construction, providing a Thanksgiving dinner for Leo and Ruth, ensuring they felt cherished and valued.

Through their selfless acts of service, Delmarva Veteran Builders exemplifies the power of community, compassion, and camaraderie. Each ramp built is more than just a structure; it's a symbol of hope, resilience, and the enduring spirit of those who serve. Dave Gutoskey: Empowering Salisbury University Students to Make an Impact



Meet Dave Gutoskey, a dedicated volunteer leader at Salisbury University, whose passion for community service has sparked a movement of change-makers within the university's student body. Through his leadership and tireless efforts, Dave has been instrumental in mobilizing Salisbury University

students to participate in transformative service projects with Chesapeake Housing Mission. His commitment to empowering others and fostering a culture of compassion has not only impacted the lives of those in need but has also inspired a ripple effect of positive change throughout the university community. Join us as we delve into Dave's journey of service and the profound impact he's making one build at a time.

“ Back around 2014, our director level leadership team at Salisbury University had been looking for a service project that we could do as a team, when we heard about Chesapeake Housing Mission. After a brief CHM presentation, we decided to register for a project. About 12 department directors along with our vice president, volunteered to build a ramp for a 93-year-old neighbor in need. The project seemed simple and straightforward but was complicated by the root systems of extremely mature trees, and the fact that our group's ages ranged from early 40s to mid-60s, added to the challenge. With the incredible CHM project team in charge of our group, of which not one had done a build before, we completed the project and I was hooked.

The following year I brought 2 more SU teams to CHM and found myself moving into a very active volunteer manager type position for builds. During this time, it became clear to me that Salisbury University was an incredible resource for the organization, when considering there were at least 9,000 students, staff and faculty to market this extraordinary service option. I began reaching out to athletic teams, student organizations, fellow directors, and some faculty I knew who were active with their students in the community.

Following a recent SU staff build this past November, one of my colleagues asked how many builds I had participated in since becoming active with CHM. I really never gave it any thought before. She encouraged me to think about it because she had nominated me for a System of Maryland Service award for commitment to community service. CHM staff were able to ascertain that since 2016, I had been the project manager on 41 builds with SU groups.

Why Chesapeake Housing Mission? I don't know where to begin. The CHM staff is kind, loving, patient and all around just a pleasure to work side by side with. Certainly, the organization's mission to serve those in our community in need, who do not have the financial resources to create or sustain an accessibly safe living environment, is a core value which I do identify with personally.

The benefit to the client is primary and noticeable but the "comprehensive benefit ripple" continues out to impact and change whoever is involved. During the day, I listen to those on the build. Their sentiments usually center around feeling empowered as the project evolves, expressing initial doubts about its completion within a day, or expressing disbelief at what the group is accomplishing. From a volunteer leader's vantage point I get a charge out of seeing an anxious, eager and unskilled crew walk onto a build site, see the plans and have that "no way we are getting this done in a day" look in their eyes. As the morning hours pass, team confidence grows and the look changes to "I think we just might do this in a day" or "I can't believe we are doing this!"

The reveal though is the most powerful part of the project as the client, many times with their caregivers, come join the group for the final picture on their new accessible entrance to their home. Typically, both express their extreme appreciation, usually with tears. That's when I can see in the eyes of the volunteers that they understand the profound impact their group has just had on one of our neighbor's lives. Their 8 hours of service together, enjoying each other's company while learning a new skill, have just resulted in the improvement of the quality of another person's life and the lives of their loved ones forever.

Here are some of the outcomes I have observed over the years on almost every build. Clients get some of their independence and dignity back through the hard work of strangers, also showing them they are not only not forgotten, but loved. The caregivers express how their lives have been transformed, now effortlessly aiding their relative or friend in and out of their home, with the once time-consuming task dramatically shortened, and the risk of transition accidents nearly eliminated. Volunteers walk away from a project educated, empowered, excited and most importantly humbled to have been able to serve another.



Factors impacting resilience, particularly concerning the ability to safely age in one's own home and avoid institutionalization, are linked to home modifications that enhance health and safety. While essential home repairs can be costly, CHM is among the pioneering organizations in the U.S. showcasing the returns on these investments through savings in Medicare and Medicaid expenses. By conducting client surveys and collaborating with TidalHealth to access healthcare utilization and cost data, we can evaluate the improvements in health-related metrics and cost reductions resulting from the repairs we've undertaken.

Let's review our 2022 results to gauge our progress.

Introduced to CHM through a ramp project while at the hospital, Melinda found herself immersed in a community-driven initiative fueled by a shared passion for service and faith. Inspired by

the organization's efficiency and dedication to its mission, Melinda was called to a deeper involvement, eventually stepping into the role of Volunteer Coordinator. Through her following testimonial, Melinda reflects on the profound impact of CHM's ministry, highlighting moments of awe, divine intervention, and the tangible expression of God's love through service to others.

“ I worked in higher education at a local university for about a decade, then left to move to neighboring Worcester County and started working at AGH as an executive assistant. In that position, I was able to serve on a Chesapeake Housing Mission ramp build in Worcester County along with my husband who loves to build. We think of our Lord, Jesus, who learned the same building techniques while on earth!

I was in awe serving on that build, with how empowered I felt, using the smaller screw gun which fit in my petite hand perfectly. We quickly and efficiently positioned and put down the platform, then ramp planks. I was also amazed at how our small hospital team of volunteers was led by some get-er-done super-efficient gentlemen from Chesapeake Housing Mission. They had everything perfectly organized and planned out like a well-oiled machine. The fact that we completed the ramp with such a small team by early afternoon was astounding! It was all thanks to CHM's excellence with the planning, organizing, and facilitating the build. Presenting the Bible to the client at the end was the cherry on top! I found it a moment of wonder that this organization is sharing the love of Jesus in a profound, tangible way!

In late 2022, I received a call from the CHM executive director asking if I was interested in the position of Volunteer Coordinator. I had left my executive assistant role, allowing me to focus on ministry school online, prayed about it, and said "yes!" Serving in this role for a Christian mission was just what the Great Physician ordered. This allowed me to pray for clients both over the phone and in person, sharing the profound love of Jesus. The love of God overflows as I'm able to work with and for this inspiring organization.

Throughout my short time with CHM, much has changed rapidly, and all for the better! In my first meeting with Lachelle, CHM's new executive director, I was under contract for a house in Florida and asked the Lord if I should share that news yet in our meeting. No sooner than I asked Him, Lachelle asked about my future plans and I divulged the news. My jaw dropped in that conversation when she shared that the Volunteer Coordinator role was about to transition to all online! Now, I'm able to continue joyfully serving this great ministry, calling clients of all four counties, coordinating volunteers, and calling for outcomes after project completion.

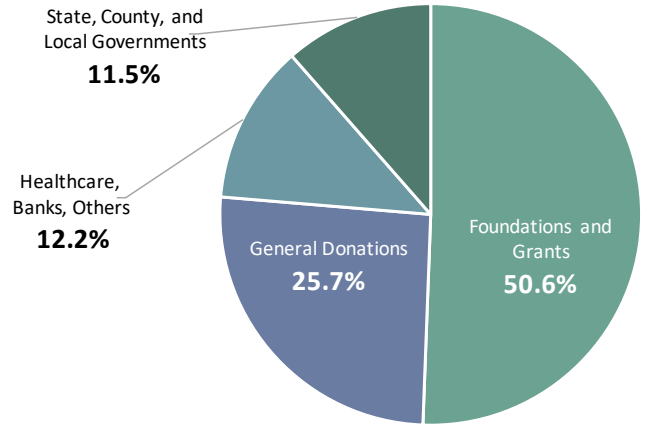

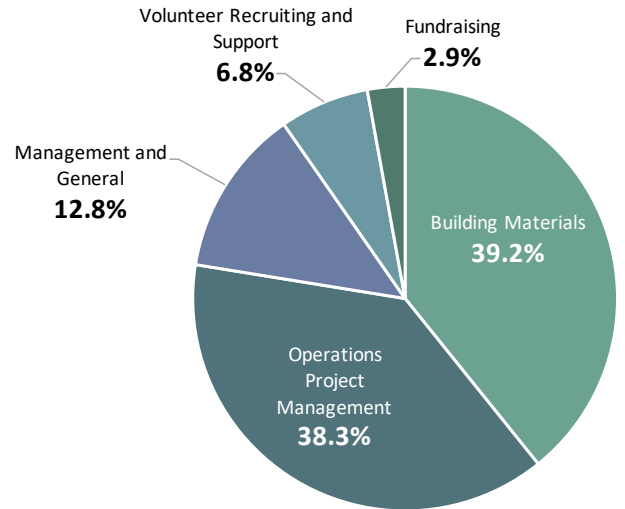
SOURCE OF INCOME
